### ANNEX 1: THE PROCESS

How were MS/EU+ present in the country involved in the drafting of the RM?	Member States were consulted on the draft document and requested to include their respective actions, or proposals, to engage with civil society.
What mechanisms are set up to ensure the involvement of MS/EU+ in the implementation and follow up of the RM?	Member States are always informed about the EUD work with civil society, among others: CSO EU funded projects, new calls for proposals/info sessions and events. At least 2 meetings per year are done with MS to update on the EUD work with civil society and try to coordinate efforts.
What consultations with CSOs were organised? What type of actors were involved? What mechanisms, if any, were used to ensure the inclusiveness of the process?	A survey was sent out to a wide cross section of CSOs that were engaged on a regular basis with the Delegation and member states. The Delegation consulted local, international, youth and women organisations through meetings to discuss on the roadmap, the MIP and the CLIP. The 67 responses were analysed and included in the document.
What mechanisms, are set up to continue the dialogue with CSOs? What mechanisms, if any, will be used to ensure the inclusiveness of the dialogue?	TWGs( technical working groups) , SWGs( Sector working groups) and regular consultation will continue based on specific areas as well as cross cutting areas.
