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### 1. Introduction

- 1.1. Introducing the character
- → the character will appear on the screen
  - → Hi! My name is 2QT. I'm from the planet Zgweegu.
- → the character hovers
  - → I am an inter-galactic fashion designer.
- → clothing appears in the background
  - → I design rocket propelled clothes.
- → rocket shoes appear in the background
  - → I came to Earth because I am fascinated by your shoes.
  - → I have a great idea: I can design rocket propelled shoes!
- → the EU is indicated on the map
  - → Europeans love shoes. I will make my shoes in the European Union.
- → 2QT puzzled (can't get his robot head around it)
  - → 2QT: But if I start a business, I'll have a lot of responsibilities.
  - → 2QT: I want to know: Do businesses pay tax?

# 2. Presentation of the taxes paid by companies

- 2.1. Taxes created to support the protection of the environment
  - A factory seen from above. Zoom in on the factory (the factory produces smartphones)
  - A panel in the scene with: SmartFactory + the company logo. Three workers on the factory line work on the conveyor, animated actions of the workers and the conveyor. The workers are happy.
    - $\rightarrow$  2QT: Hello! This looks like a place where they make things.
    - → 2QT: This reminds me of the **factory** which makes my clothes on my planet. Maybe I can learn more.
    - → 2QT: (looking at the name and logo panel): Ah! They produce smartphones here. That is fantastic!







- The process of arranging the final goods in the warehouse. A worker controlling the packages.
  - → 2QT: What are you doing?
  - → Female worker: We are packing up the smartphones and sending them to the stores to be sold.
- Workers loading a truck with products from the warehouse. The truck goes away.
- Mobile phone store. A customer buys a smartphone. The money Jacques the salesman receives is divided into two piles.
- The customer goes out of the store. The salesman remains.
  - → 2QT: That boy bought a smartphone. What do you do with the money he paid?
  - → Jacques the Salesman (indicating the first pile of money): The store keeps a bit, and we send the rest back to the factory.
  - → Jacques the Salesman: With this, the boss will pay the factory workers, he will buy materials to make more phones, and soon he will have enough to buy better machinery (a text bubble illustrating the initial factory image with 3 workers next to the conveyor appears).
  - → 2QT: So if they sell a lot, the factory will have more workers?
  - → Jacques the Salesman: Yes, when we sell more, the business grows and we can pay more workers and make the factory better.
  - → (The text bubble is now illustrating an image with 5 workers next to the conveyor).
  - → Jacques the Salesman (indicating the second pile of money): This money is the tax we pay to the State Budget (a text bubble illustrating the State Vault appears). Because the company is efficient, we make a **profit**. More money comes in to the business from sales than is needed to pay all the costs. So this tax is called **income tax**.
  - → 2QT: What happens to the income tax paid to the State budget?
  - → Jacques the Salesman All taxes go to the State budget as a whole and then the State spends and invests the money for the benefit of the citizens.
- Image representing the truck that delivered the smartphones to the store appears on the road.
- The road presents holes in the road; the truck has to stop because of them.







- → Text on the screen: Some tax money is used to create better business infrastructure.
- For example: the business uses the roads, and lots of trucks make holes. Tax pays to repair the roads so that they are safe to drive on.
- The holes in the road are being repaired by State workers; the truck goes on the road again.
  - → 2QT (thinking): The money the company paid in tax solved that problem.
  - → Text on the screen: And this is just one example of how companies receive great services from the Public Budget to which they contribute.
  - → 2QT (happy): Now the business can make more money and give jobs to more people!

## 2.2. Business taxes give benefits to employees

- An image with the City Line. One of the factory workers in a car with his family.
- A policeman stops the car to allow a truck to park in front of the hospital.
  - → 2QT: Why are you stopping them?
  - → Policeman: To let the truck get to the hospital. I don't want an accident.
  - $\rightarrow$  20T: What is in the truck?
  - → Policeman: Remember the taxes paid by local businesses that went to the State Budget? (Add Bubble speech with the Vault from min 02:43)
  - → Policeman: The State invested in this hospital that has got bigger and better.
  - → Policeman: The truck brings all kinds of **products and materials** needed for the **new departments**.
  - → 2QT: Bought with the money the factory paid to the State in tax?
  - → Policeman: Exactly. Now people can get **better care** in our city.
  - → 2QT: I am very impressed.
  - → 2QT: I wonder what else do business taxes help to do?
- The screen moves to the school.







- → Policeman: Business tax that go to the State Budget are also invested in the education system.
- → 2QT: So, some of the money paid by the Smartphone Factory went to the school, too.
- → Policeman: Yes. The school has just got a school bus for the students.
- → Policeman: **Education** is very important to the companies, too. Well trained employees can help the business grow and develop.
- The screen moves to the Police Station.
  - → 2QT: They are dressed exactly like you. They must be your colleagues.
  - → Policeman: Yes, that's right. We keep law and order so that people and property are safe.
  - → 2QT: So now I understand. Business tax also helps pay for the Police.
  - → 2QT: And I think that the **public security benefits the companies**. For example, they have less robberies.
- A garbage truck passes by on the street.
  - → Policeman: Yes. Now you understand.
  - → Policeman: It is a system where everyone contributes, and everybody benefits.
  - → 2QT: Employees and customers are **healthy** and live in a clean, **secure** city. Their children are healthy and get a proper education.
  - → 2QT: And so the workers have **good jobs** and **help the company grow**.
  - → 2QT (happy): I want to start my company now so I can help, too!
